GUIDELINES

- Essays may be submitted by anyone up to 25 years old (as of June 30, 2010) in one of the following age categories:
 a) Children (ages up to 14)
 b) Youth (ages 15 - 25)
- Essays must be 800 words or less in English, French, Spanish or German; or 1600 characters or less in Japanese, typed or printed.
- 3. Essays must have a cover page indicating (1) category (Children or Youth) (2) essay title (3) your name (4) mailing address (5) phone number (6) e-mail address (7) nationality (8) age as of June 30, 2010 (9) sex (10) school name (if applicable) (11) word count. Teachers and youth directors may submit a collection of essays from their class or group. Please enclose a list of participants' names and the name and contact information of the submitting teacher or director. (Entries missing any of the above information will not be considered.)
- Entries may be submitted by postal mail or e-mail. (Email entries must be in text or MS Word format, with the cover page and essay sent together as one document.)

- Essays must be original and unpublished.
- 6. Essays must be written by one person. Co-authored essays are not accepted.
- Copyright of the essays entered will be assigned to the organizers.

Entries must be received by June 30, 2010.

- 1st prize winners will be invited to the award ceremony in Tokyo, Japan scheduled for November 2010. (Travel
 expenses will be covered by the organizers.)

Through the Sand Book Project

HE idea of Sand Book was inspired from the trip organised to the sea. The teacher gave to her students some words and letters to write on the sand. She was surprised that all her students were integrated in this activity even the weak one!

One more noticeable thing was that the way the students enjoyed writing on the sand. From there came the idea in mind and instantly the teacher described the project to the students and they started gathering the material from the sea shore.

When they came back to school the students started





making their project.

They produce an attractive Sand Book and they started using it in classroom activities.

The teacher gave the students various games and activities to use with the sand book with the integration of all language skills.

The Sand Book became one of the most precious materials in the classroom. The students enjoyed writing and feeling letters.

They found it funny. They used it in the Chinese whisper in other version: students line up into two lines the two at the back come to the teacher and

see a word, go at the back and draw it on their friend back and the later writes the word on the back of the one in front of him or her, and so on the one at the front writes it on the sand book if it is correct they score one point, and go at the back to give to another student the opportunity of writing on the sand book.

They used the Sand book not only in writing letters and words but also in writing numbers and drawing shapes. It was suitable for all grades. It was integrated as a warm up and also as a main activity.

The success of this Project inspired the teacher's creativity and she looked for more

original thing to stimulate students' proficiency levels.

They realised another project using the spices to write letters and numbers. This project was adapted on various configurations. Writing letters, numbers, recognising colours and shapes ... all these skills demonstrate the versatility and adaptability of the project work.

As we had demonstrated beforehand about the versatility and adaptability of the projects with their various configurations, the project had a very positive effect on the students' motivation and readability to learn.

The teacher wanted to spread the sphere of the project to extend at home to be the suitable and natural atmosphere to practice such activities.

For these reasons she presented an elaborated workshop to the mothers explaining how to adopt this project at home and its various configurations and use not only in English but also in Arabic and Mathematics.

All the mothers were happy and thanked the teacher for these ideas that help them to teach their children at home and attract their attention by learning through playing.














